American Clock and Watch Museum.

The slate of candidates for the board is as follows: Dave Weisbart, President; Doug Adams, Vice President; Julie Stevens, Secretary; Bob Linkenhoker, Treasurer, and Doug Lynn as Director. Gene Osten made a motion to accept the slate of candidates. Motion passed by voice vote. The installation will be held at the January meeting.

Dave announced that at the December meeting, if you bring a plate of goodies, you get in for free. The program will be "Horology Follies."

Ray Brown presented the Beginner's Corner, "The 2009 Greater LA Regional Exhibit." The exhibit will be AC Collector Clocks. Ray brought a few examples including a great looking Art Deco clock, a '50s Mastercrafters that lights up. If you have an interesting AC clock, Ray wants it for the display! There were lots of questions and comments, thanks, Ray!

The evening's program was given by Jim Glidewell on, "The Making of a Skeleton Clock." Jim is President of Chapter 130 and a member of Chapter 136. Jim gave credit to Otto Gabler as technical director and Elsa Glidewell, photographer.

Jim has been a collector for many years and wanted to make a clock. After lots of thought, he decided it was too much of a task, and after more thought, he decided to make a skeleton clock, but not an ordinary one. He came across a grandfather's clock movement made of bronze with ivory pallets. The time train was in perfect condition, but the chime and strike train had parts missing.



Jim drew what he thought the finished clock should be, then cut the paper and glued it to metal for strength. He bought two sheets of 3/16" of brass, expecting the cost to be \$30. It was \$200 – so no mistakes! He cut the pattern in half and bolts it to the brass. He cut the outside with a band saw, cutting and cutting for hours. Then, hours of filing. The inside portions, he cut with a jeweler's saw – the hardest part of the job. Then filed and filed again. He drilled the pivot holes. Polished the brass with jeweler's rouge and a 1" wheel. Dirt right up the front of his shirt. He used the posts out of the old movement and began assembly.

He made the pendulum hanger and suspension spring. He said that was the easy part. He guessed at the length of the pendulum. It worked the first time!

For the dial, he used the center of an old Vienna Regulator dial he had. It fit perfectly. The hands were put on, the 3' pendulum, and it did run!

Jim made a wooden shelf with praying hands inlaid in the wood. Pray that it works! And it did.

Jim said the entire project took eight months and many, many, many hours. When asked if he would make another, he said yes, but this time he will go to a motorcycle shop where they cut brass with water in minutes!

The evening's Show and Tell was the Letter "M" or "AC Power Clocks." Les Lesovsky brought a Morbier. He said the "Other Kind of French Clock" compared to last months Brocot's. The Morbier and the Brocot are



from the same period, 1870. The Morbier's do not have the same delicacy of the Brocot. They strike on the hour, and then again a minute later. There is no warning before striking, they just go. Made to last 200 years! It has an anchor escapement, capable of driving an ornate brass pendulum. Tony asked why it strikes twice? Tony said he lost four hours of his life when repairing one of these. He thought it was his mistake that it was striking twice. There are two stories that were shared, one, the people out in the fields would hear the striking, stop work and wait again to count the strikes. Another story is the time between the striking allowed time for prayer.



Bernie Peralta brought a Movado Museum Watch. Most of them are black with a gold dot at the 12:00. Bernie's has a muted red dial. This is a transition watch between Movado and Zenith, as the dial has both names. It is a wind up watch. Movado means Motion, in Esperanto.

Doug Lynn brought a vial of Mercury! Or Mercury vapors that found at a Swap Meet. Dave Weisbart brought Ansonia's Macbeth, with a perfect dial. Ray Brown brought an AC powered Mystery Clock, a Jefferson Helmsman clock. an Anchor is the hand.

Dave thanked Derald and Irene Kliem for handling and mailing the Tic Toc Times.

The door prizes were won by Elsa Glidewell, Doug Adams and Doug Lynn.

this linear time into short bursts which represent a known fraction of an agreed-upon average of our earth's rotation and its orbit around the sun. It's a curious obsession for some of us, yet for most people, it is a casually accepted reference for measuring our linear time.

When we "look back" at time that has passed, we retrieve scattered memories and a few recordings of what was. When we "look forward," some things we can predict with relative certainty, but most of our thoughts about the future are shaped by our individual emotional natures. Some view the future with fear, others with hope. We are certain, however, that tomorrow will be 24 hours long.

When I look back at the last 11 months (or 334 days, or 8,016 hours), my memories include both great personal joy, and the anguish of my community over losses of property, economic security, and civil rights. But I am, I think, a hopeful person with regard to the future. (I think any self-employed person has to be.) As I am now closer to the end of my life than its beginning, and as my perception of time changes (can someone tell me where October went?), my personal past becomes an ever-richer tapestry of life experiences, and I become somewhat more sanguine about my future.

So I shall continue my work of dividing linear time as accurately as my chosen technology allows. And time, as the saying goes, marches on. Happy New Year (whatever that means).
